

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS

Lesson Nine

The purpose of this lesson is to discover the unique nature of the birth of Jesus. The story of his birth is found in the first chapter of the first book of the New Testament in the Holy Bible.

Bible verses from Matthew

Matthew 1:18 This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit.

- 19 Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.
- 20 But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in

a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.

- 21 She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."
- 22 All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet:
- 23 "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" --which means, "God with us."
- 24 When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife.
- 25 But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

Definitions and Explanations

See Matthew 1:18

Pledged to be married means promised, or engaged.

See Matthew 1:18

Holy Spirit refers to the Spirit of God the creator. No other prophet was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of a virgin!

See Matthew 1-21

Jesus is the Greek form of the name Joshua which means, "the Lord saves." He was given the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins. As we saw in the first book of this course, we need a savior.

See Matthew 1:23

Virgin as used regarding Mary in these verses refers to the fact that she had never had sexual relations. Never before in human history and never since has a virgin given birth, but the virgin Mary gave birth to a son and named him Jesus. This was a miraculous birth, a miracle of God.

Immanuel means, "God with us." Think about the significance of this!

See Matthew 1:25

No union as used in these verses means no sexual intercourse.

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS

Lesson Ten

The purpose of this lesson is to discover the amazing fulfillment of prophecies concerning the birth of Jesus. These are found in the first two chapters of the first book of the New Testament in the Holy Bible.

Verses from the Holy Bible

Deuteronomy 18:22 If what a prophet proclaims in the name of the LORD does not take place or come true, that is a message the LORD has not spoken. That prophet has spoken presumptuously

Isaiah 7:14 Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel.

Matthew 1:22-23 All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel"--which means, "God with us."

Micah 5:2 "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times."

Matthew 2:1-2 After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him."

Matthew 2:3-6 When King Herod heard this he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him. When he had called together all the people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Christ was to be born. "In Bethlehem in Judea," they replied, "for this is what the prophet has written: 'But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for out of you will come a ruler who will be the shepherd of my people Israel.'"

Definitions & Explanations

See Deuteronomy 18:22

A **Prophet** speaks or writes about some part of God's plan that humanly cannot be known by natural means. He is God's messenger. The test of a true prophet depends upon whether his messages always come true and none of them ever proves false.

See Matthew 1:22-23 and Isaiah 7:14

Isaiah the prophet prophesied over 600 years before the birth of Jesus.

See Matthew 2:1-2

Magi were wise men of a sacred caste of priests from Persia.

See Matthew 2:3-6 and Micah 5:2

Micah, the prophet, prophesied about the birth of Jesus 700 years before his birth.

Matthew 2:3-6

The **Christ** means the promised Messiah.

More Verses from the Holy Bible

Matthew 2:7-12 Then Herod called the Magi secretly and found out from them the exact time the star had appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and make a careful search for the child. As soon as you find him, report to me, so that I too may go and worship him." After they had heard the king, they went on their way, and the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they returned to their country by another route.

Hosea 11:1 "When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son."

Matthew 2:13-15 When they had gone, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up," he said, "take the child and his mother and escape to Egypt. Stay there until I tell you, for Herod is going to search for the child to kill him." So he got up, took the child and his mother during the night and left for Egypt, where he stayed until the death of Herod. And so was fulfilled what the Lord had said through the prophet: "Out of Egypt I called my son."

More Definitions & Explanations

See Matthew 2:13-15 and Hosea 11:1

Hosea was a prophet, who prophesied over 700 years before the birth of Jesus.

More Verses from the Holy Bible

Jeremiah 31:15 This is what the LORD says: "A voice is heard in Ramah, mourning and great weeping, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because her children are no more."

Matthew 2:16-18 When Herod realized that he had been outwitted by the Magi, he was furious, and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi. Then what was said through the prophet Jeremiah was fulfilled: "A voice is heard in Ramah, weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because they are no more."

More Definitions & Explanations

See Matthew 2:16-18 and Jeremiah 31:15

Jeremiah, another prophet, wrote his prophecy 600 years before the birth of Jesus also.

More Verses from the Holy Bible

Matthew 2:19-23 After Herod died, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother and go to the land of Israel, for those who were trying to take the child's life are dead." So he got up, took the child and his mother and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus was reigning in Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. Having been warned in a dream, he withdrew to the district of Galilee, and he went and lived in a town called Nazareth. So was fulfilled what was said through the prophets: "He will be called a Nazarene."

10h. What else was prophesied about Jesus by the prophets? (See Matthew 2:19-23)

Do you think the prophets knew at the time they prophesied when their prophecy would be fulfilled? Why or why not?

10i. How many prophecies mentioned in these verses about Jesus were fulfilled? (See Matthew 1:22-23 and Matthew 2:1-23)

Humanly speaking what are the chances that all these things prophesied 600 to 700 years before would all be fulfilled in one person?

More Verses from the Holy Bible

2 Peter 1:21 For prophecy never had its origin in the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS

Lesson Eleven

The purpose of this lesson is to discover who healed the sick and raised the dead. These accounts are found in the first four books of the New Testament in the Holy Bible.

Bible Verses from Matthew

Matthew 11: 1-6 After Jesus had finished instructing his twelve disciples, he went on from there to teach and preach in the towns of Galilee. When John heard in prison what Christ was doing, he sent his disciples to ask him, "Are you the one who was to come, or should we expect someone else?" Jesus replied, "Go back and report to John what you hear and see: The blind receive sight, the lame walk, those who have leprosy are cured, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is preached to the poor.

Blessed is the man who does not fall away on account of me."

Definitions & Explanations

See Matthew 11:1-6

The one who was to come, Christ, refers to the Messiah promised throughout the Old Testament.

Was Jesus more than a prophet? Consider the things he did. Did any other prophet restore sight to the blind, cause the lame to walk, cure a leper, cause the deaf to hear, raise a man from the dead? Jesus did!

Verses from the first four books of the New Testament

John 9:1-7 As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" "Neither this man nor his parents sinned," said Jesus, "but this happened so that the work of God might be displayed in his life. As long as it is day, we must do the work of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world." Having said this, he spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man's eyes. "Go," he told him, "wash in the Pool of Siloam" (this word means Sent). So the man went and washed, and came home seeing.

More verses from the first four books of the New Testament

John 5:1-10 Some time later, Jesus went up to Jerusalem for a feast of the Jews. Now there is in Jerusalem near the Sheep Gate a pool, which in Aramaic is called Bethesda and which is surrounded by five covered colonnades. Here a great number of disabled people used to lie--the blind, the lame, the paralyzed. One who was there had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. When Jesus saw him lying there and learned that he had been in this condition for a long time, he asked him, "Do you want to get well?" "Sir," the invalid replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am trying to get in, someone else goes down ahead of me." Then Jesus said to him, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk." At once the man was cured; he picked up his mat and walked, and so the Jews said to the man who had been healed, "It is the Sabbath; the law forbids you to

carry your mat."

John 5:17-18 Jesus said to them, "My Father is always at his work to this very day, and I, too, am working." For this reason the Jews tried all the harder to kill him; not only was he breaking the Sabbath, but he was even calling God his own Father, making himself equal with God.

More verses from the first four books of the New Testament

Matthew 8:2-3 A man with leprosy came and knelt before him and said, "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean." Jesus reached out his hand and touched the man. "I am willing," he said. "Be clean!" Immediately he was cured of his leprosy.

Mark 7:31-37 Then Jesus left the vicinity of Tyre and went through Sidon, down to the Sea of Galilee and into the region of the Decapolis. There some people brought to him a man who was deaf and could hardly talk, and they begged him to place his hand on the man. After he took him aside, away from the crowd, Jesus put his fingers into the man's ears. Then he spit and touched the man's tongue. He looked up to heaven and with a deep sigh said to him, "Ephphatha!" (which means, "Be opened!"). At this, the man's ears were opened, his tongue was loosened and he began to speak plainly. Jesus commanded them not to tell anyone. But the more he did so, the more they kept talking about it. People were overwhelmed with amazement. "He has done everything well," they said. "He even makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."

Luke 7:11-16 Soon afterward, Jesus went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went along with him. As he approached the town gate, a dead person was being carried out--the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the town was with her. When the Lord saw her, his heart went out to her and he said, "Don't cry." Then he went up and touched the coffin, and those carrying it stood still. He said, "Young man, I say to you, get up!" The dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him back to his mother. They were all filled with awe and praised God. "A great prophet has appeared among us," they said. "God has come to help his people."

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS

Lesson Twelve

The purpose of this lesson is to discover why Jesus performed other miracles. These accounts are also found in the first four books of the New Testament in the Holy Bible.

Bible verses from the first four books of the New Testament

John 2:1-11 On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine." "Dear woman, why do you involve me?" Jesus replied. "My time has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he you." Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet." They did so, and the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside and said, "Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now." This, the first of his miraculous signs, Jesus performed at Cana in Galilee. He thus revealed his glory, and his disciples put their faith in him.

Matthew 8:23-27 Then he got into the boat and his disciples followed him. Without warning, a furious storm came up on the lake, so that the waves swept over the boat. But Jesus was sleeping. The disciples went and woke him, saying, "Lord, save us! We're going to drown!" He replied, "You of little faith, why are you so afraid?" Then he got up and rebuked the winds and the waves, and it was completely calm. The men were amazed and asked,

"What kind of man is this? Even the winds and the waves obey him!"

Definitions

See John 2:1-11

Miraculous signs or miracles are supernatural events, taken as evidence of divine authority, which unmistakably involve an immediate, and powerful action designed to reveal God's character or purposes.

More Bible verses from the first four books of the New Testament

Mark 6:34-44 When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So he began teaching them many things. By this time it was late in the day, so his disciples came to him. "This is a remote place," they said, "and it's already Send the people away so they can go to the surrounding verv late. countryside and villages and buy themselves something to eat." answered, "You give them something to eat." They said to him, "That would take eight months of a man's wages! Are we to go and spend that much on bread and give it to them to eat?" "How many loaves do you have?" he asked. "Go and see." When they found out, they said, "Five--and two fish." Then Jesus directed them to have all the people sit down in groups on the green grass. So they sat down in groups of hundreds and fifties. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to his disciples to set before the people. He also divided the two fish among them all. They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces of bread and fish. The number of the men who had eaten was five thousand.

John 21:25 "Jesus did many other things as well. If every one of them were written down, I suppose that even the whole world would not have room for the books that would be written."

Mark 6:45-52 Immediately Jesus made his disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to Bethsaida, while he dismissed the crowd. After leaving them, he went up on a mountainside to pray. When evening came, the boat

was in the middle of the lake, and he was alone on land. He saw the disciples straining at the oars, because the wind was against them. About the fourth watch of the night he went out to them, walking on the lake. He was about to pass by them, but when they saw him walking on the lake, they thought he was a ghost. They cried out, because they all saw him and were terrified. Immediately he spoke to them and said, "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." Then he climbed into the boat with them, and the wind died down. They were completely amazed for they had not understood about the loaves; their hearts were hardened.

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS

Lesson Thirteen

The purpose of this lesson is to discover the authority with which Jesus taught. His teachings are found in the first four books of the New Testament in the Holy Bible.

Bible verses from the first four books of the New Testament

Matthew 7:28-29 When Jesus had finished saying these things, the crowds were amazed at his teaching, because he taught as one who had authority, and not as their teachers of the law.

Matthew 9:1-8 Jesus stepped into a boat, crossed over and came to his own town. Some men brought to him a paralytic, lying on a mat. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Take heart, son; your sins are forgiven." At this, some of the teachers of the law said to themselves, "This

fellow is blaspheming!" Knowing their thoughts, Jesus said, "Why do you entertain evil thoughts in your hearts? Which is easier: to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up and walk'? But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins. . . . " Then he said to the paralytic, "Get up, take your mat and go home." And the man got up and went home. When the crowd saw this, they were filled with awe; and they praised God, who had given such authority to men.

Matthew 13:53-58 When Jesus had finished these parables, he moved on from there. Coming to his hometown, he began teaching the people in their synagogue, and they were amazed. "Where did this man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers?" they asked. "Isn't this the carpenter's son? Isn't his mother's name Mary, and aren't his brothers James, Joseph, Simon and Judas? Aren't all his sisters with us? Where then did this man get all these things?" And they took offense at him. But Jesus said to them, "Only in his hometown and in his own house is a prophet without honor." And he did not do many miracles there because of their lack of faith.

More Bible verses from the first four books of the New Testament

Matthew 28:18-20 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Mark 1:21-22 They went to Capernaum, and when the Sabbath came, Jesus went into the synagogue and began to teach. The people were amazed at his

teaching, because he taught them as one who had authority, not as the teachers of the law.

Luke 4:31-36 Then he went down to Capernaum, a town in Galilee, and on the Sabbath began to teach the people. They were amazed at his teaching, because his message had authority. In the synagogue there was a man possessed by a demon, an evil spirit. He cried out at the top of his voice, "Ha! What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are--the Holy One of God!" "Be quiet!" Jesus said sternly. "Come out of him!" Then the demon threw the man down before them all and came out without injuring him. All the people were amazed and said to each other, "What is this teaching? With authority and power he gives orders to evil spirits and they come out!"

John 3:1-2 Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish ruling council. He came to Jesus at night and said, "Rabbi, we know you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the miraculous signs you are doing if God were not with him."

John 4:39-42 Many of the Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony, "He told me everything I ever did." So when the Samaritans came to him, they urged him to stay with them, and he stayed two days. And because of his words many more became believers. They said to the woman, "We no longer believe just because of what you said; now we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this man really is the Savior of the world."

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS Lesson Fourteen

The purpose of this lesson is to discover that his birth on earth is not His beginning. This truth is found throughout the Holy Bible.

Verses from the Holy Bible

John 1:1-5 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it.

John 1:6-8 There came a man who was sent from God; his name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all men might believe. He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light.

John 10:17-18 The reason my Father loves me is that I lay down my life--only to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down and authority to take it up again. This command I received from my Father."

Hebrews 2:9 But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because he suffered death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

Foreknowledge refers to God's knowledge of the future.

The Names and Titles of Jesus

Jesus is a Greek version of the Hebrew "Joshua," which means salvation is from Yahweh. His very name suggests His purpose. "He shall save his people from their sins" (Matt. 1:21). This One is Immanuel, God with us (Isa. 7:14; Matt. 1:23). Mark began his brief Gospel in some manuscripts by introducing Jesus as the Son of God (Mark 1:1). Luke's shepherds knew Him as "a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:11). Paul addressed Him as "the Lord"--the earliest Christian confession was that Jesus (is) Lord. The Gospels herald the message of the Son of Man, He who was humbled, who suffered, who will come again. Thomas, known for his doubting, should also be remembered for faith's greatest application about Christ: "My Lord and my God" (John 20:28). The metaphors of John's Gospel invite us to reflect on Jesus Christ, God's great necessity. John portrays Jesus as the Water of life (4:14); the Bread of life (6:41); the Light (8:12); the Door (10:7); the Good Shepherd (10:11); the Resurrection and the Life (11:25); the Way, the Truth, the Life (14:6).

Christ means Messiah, the Saviour of the world.

Lord is a title of relationship as Master.

Ransom refers to the price paid to deliver from a penalty.

The **one mediator**, the man Christ Jesus, was the negotiator or peacemaker who came between God and men and made a personal relationship for men with God possible. He is the guarantee that satisfies God's requirements.

See Hebrews 10:9-10 and Romans 3:23-26

The **sacrifice**, the price required by God for our cleansing from sin, was provided by God through Jesus.

See 1 Peter 2:24

Righteousness is the character or quality of being right or just.

See Romans 3:23-26

Justified means to be declared righteous and found not guilty even though we are.

Atonement refers specifically to the reconciliation between God and humanity effected by the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ.

Forbearance refers to God's patience expressed in God's willingness to hold back judgment for a time. It does not mean that God condones sin, but that God gives opportunity for repentance.

John 20:1-9 Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and said, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!" So Peter and the other

disciple started for the tomb. Both were running, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent over and looked in at the strips of linen lying there but did not go in. Then Simon Peter, who was behind him, arrived and went into the tomb, He saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the burial cloth that had been around Jesus' head. The cloth was folded up by itself, separate from the linen. Finally the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed. (They still did not understand from Scripture that Jesus had to rise from the dead.)

They asked her, "Woman, why are you crying?" "They have taken my Lord away," she said, "and I don't know where they have put him." At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realize that it was Jesus. "Woman," he said, "why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said, "Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet returned to the Father. Go instead to my

brothers and tell them, 'I am returning to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!" And she told them that he had said these things to her.

KNOWING GOD THROUGH JESUS Summary

The book of John closes with this verse, "Jesus did many other things as well. If every one of them were written down, I suppose that even the whole world would not have room for the books that would be written." Let's review what we have discovered about God in these lessons about Jesus and our relationship to Him.

First, we discovered that the birth of Jesus was a miraculous birth; born of a virgin and conceived by the Holy Spirit of God, the gift of God to save us from our sins.

Second, we discovered that several details regarding the birth of Christ were prophesied hundreds of years before the birth of Jesus and were fulfilled exactly at His birth. This amazing phenomenon should capture our attention.

Third, we discovered that Jesus restored sight to the blind, caused the lame to walk, cured a leper, caused the deaf to hear, and raised a man from the dead! He obviously is more than a prophet.

Fourth, we discovered why Jesus did many other miracles such as turning water into wine, calming a storm by rebuking the wind, feeding over five thousand men besides women and children with five loaves of bread and two small fish, or walking on water, to display the power of God.

Fifth, we discovered the authority with which Jesus taught and that we should submit to His authority.

Sixth, we discovered that the birth of Jesus was not His beginning, that He existed from the beginning, and is worthy of our worship.

Seventh, we discovered that God chose to manifest Himself in human flesh in order to die for our sins.

Eighth, we discovered what Jesus did for us when He died on the cross and what we have as a result. There is no greater love. He gave His life for you. Will you live your life for Him?

Ninth, we discovered that Jesus rose from the grave, that He is alive! He wants a personal relationship with you. Invite Him into your heart and life. Ask him today to be your Savior and Lord.

Tenth, we discovered that hundreds of people saw the living, Lord Jesus Christ after His resurrection. We discovered that if you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. And we discovered that He ascended into heaven where He is preparing a place for all those who have chosen Him to be their Savior.

Our prayer is that you might experience the joy of knowing that God loves you, that your sins are forgiven, and that He will welcome you into His heaven.

Are you ready to accept Jesus? If yes, confess Jesus as Lord. If you have already accepted are you leading your life as a follower of Jesus?
